## Dreams and Dances

## Program Notes

The title for our program, *Dreams and Dances*, comes from the final set of three songs, beginning with a dance, then a dream, then hope for the future. Our music this evening will take you on paths from childhood to death to renewal.

The concert begins with a set of choruses from the great English composer Benjamin Britten's opera *Gloriana*, about the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. The choruses are taken from a masque, or pageant, that the people of Norwich put on for the queen's pleasure. The first three are dances depicting Time and Concord (harmony) coming together, the second part is a tribute to the queen directlywomen's chorus and men's chorus each list what they bring in the queen's honor. The final chorus laments the queen's departure. All of the choruses, except the second, are in some kind of triple or compound meter-very fitting for the dances.

Then we travel to *Fern Hill* in the Welsh countryside, the setting for Dylan Thomas's elegant poem about youth and age. The rich textual imagery is interwoven melodically by Corigliano, enabling the chorale to sing this deeply affecting memoir of childhood, its sensual delights and its innocence of death. The poem will be familiar to many of you, but follow it along in the program to see how the composer has extended and augmented words with music.

The short *Elegischer Gesang* (Elegy) by Beethoven, and an excerpt from Heinrich Schütz's *Musikalische Exequien* (German Requiem), both convey the peace that comes with death. We are all familiar with the unique structure of Brahms' *Requiem*, where the composer selected the German texts himself rather than using the church's prescribed liturgy. For his own German Requiem, Schütz set to music texts chosen by Henry II Reuss, Count of Gera, to be performed at the Count's funeral. You will hear only a short excerpt from this longer work. Schütz's musical style may not seem somber as would be expected because of the topic, but underlying all of his sacred writing is the joy of life after death. So, the music is full of rhythmic vitality, constantly playing with the accents of the German language and the expected emphases in the meter.

After Beethoven and Schütz comes contemporary composer Ola Gjeilo's *Across the Vast Eternal Sky*, about a phoenix waiting to arise into the sunshine. This transformative work leads us into the dancing conclusion of our concert, beginning with *Der Tanz* (The Dance) by Schubert and concluding with Gwyneth Walker's *Dreams and Dances*, settings for three poems by the late Lucille Clifton. In *Bones Be Good*, listen to the poet's body keep on clicking -- the sound of old bones "dancing for my life!" While listening to *Some Dreams Hang in the Air*, hear how the composer allows the poet's words to hang in the air "like smoke." It is my hope that *Let There Be New Flowering* will leave you inspired by the poet's own wish that "love will be at the end."

#### The Performers

The **Davis Chorale** was founded in 1978 as a community chorus providing an opportunity for adults to sing oratorio, sacred and secular works. The Chorale is an auditioned choral ensemble of about 50 singers from the surrounding Davis area. The Chorale's varied repertoire ranges from Renaissance *a cappella* works to orchestral works with chorus by contemporary composers such as Eric Whitacre. The venues range from Interfaith Evening Vespers in the Davis Community Church, to the Bach *B Minor Mass* in UC Davis' Mondavi Center, to an annual holiday concert in the Capitol Rotunda in Sacramento.

Alison Skinner has been the Artistic Director of the Davis Chorale since 2010. Before returning to her hometown of Davis, Skinner lived in Philadelphia, where she was the Artistic Director of the Rainbow Chorale of Delaware for the 2007-2008 season and taught high school music at Germantown Friends School. Skinner has a B.A. in vocal performance from UC Santa Cruz and an M.M. in Choral Conducting from Temple University, where she was a student of Alan Harler. Skinner also maintains a private vocal studio.

Ellen Schinnerer Deffner, Davis Chorale Accompanist, began specializing in piano accompaniment in London, where she was a student at the Guildhall School of Music. She has been on the faculties of Guildhall London, UC Santa Barbara, Reed College, and the University of Portland. She is a member of the Sacramento Baroque Soloists.

Noted for her artistry and captivating stage presence, Mezzo soprano Tania Lillich Mannion has been performing in the Greater Sacramento area and North Bay since 2003. Her oratorio career has included work with Sacramento Choral Society and Orchestra (Mendelssohn's *Elijah*, Mozart's *Coronation Mass*), Sing Napa Valley! (Mozart's *Requiem*, Handel's *Messiah*, Vivaldi's *Gloria*, Dvorak's *Mass in D*), Davis Chorale (Bach's *Magnificat*, Mozart's *Mass in C*, Schubert's *Mass in G*) and Mother Lode Friend's of Music (Pergolesi's *Stabat Mater*, Bach's *Missa in F*, Telemann's, *Ich danke dem Herrn*). In addition to oratorio, Ms. Mannion also presents recitals of art song and opera arias, including a recent performance of Brahm's Liebeslieder for a Sing Napa Valley! salon recital. Ms. Mannion directs the Davis Children's Chorale and maintains a private voice studio in Davis where she lives with her husband and son.

Rei Luu, violin, is currently a graduate student at California State University, Sacramento and a student of Ian Swensen. A native of Santa Barbara, she began her violin studies with Barbara Coventry at age four, and went on to study with Nina Bodnar, Gilles Apap, and Mary Beth Woodruff. Rei has studied orchestra and chamber music as well as solo repertoire from a young age at the Music and Arts Conservatory of Santa Barbara. She is a two-time winner of the AJ and Susanna Watson Stude3nt Chamber Music Competition as well as the first prize winner of the CSUS Concerto Competition. In college, she has attended many music festivals over the past few years, including the Orchestral Institute of Napa Valley where she has had the opportunity to study with members of the Russian National Orchestra this past summer. Currently, Rei is a member of many orchestras and groups around the Northern Californian area and is employed at two private music schools.

**Drew Cylinder** is currently a Biochemistry and Molecular Biology Major at UC Davis. He began studying the violin at the age of 7 and joined the Sacramento Youth Symphony two years later. During his time with the Sacramento Youth Symphony he served as concertmaster in all three of their orchestras. In college he played with the UC Davis Symphony Orchestra as assistant concertmaster for two years and has played in various chamber ensembles.

Jonathan Fleuter started learning viola at the age of 17 in 2008 (after being self-taught on the clarinet for several years previous) from instructor Ingrid Gaston and in 2009 he auditioned for and placed into the CODA State Honor Orchestra. Also in 2009, Jonathan began his undergraduate studies at CSU Sacramento in Instrumental Performance on both the clarinet and viola. Two years later, he was required to choose just one and continued on with the viola. In 2012 his chamber group won the AJ and Susanna Watson Student Chamber Music Competition and were again selected as winners in 2013. Throughout his education in music, he has also won various group performances for FeNAM, New Millennium and Composer's competitions. He is currently Assistant Principal Violist of the Sac State Symphony Orchestra and a substitute teacher for music schools in Carmichael, Folsom and Elk Grove.

Dan Barker, a native of Ohio, began to study cello at age 9. His primary teachers have been Linda Unkefer (Milwaukee Symphony), Don White (Cleveland Orchestra), David Chickering (Chicago Symphony), Crispin Campbell, Andor Toth. He holds a postgraduate double diploma from Interlochen Arts Academy, a B.Mus. from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and a M.Mus. from California State University Sacramento. He has attended festivals such as the Indiana String Academy with Richard Aaron and Nancy Snustad, the Weathersfield Music Festival with Roland and Almida Vamos, and also has participated in Improvisational and Non-Classical workshops such as Music for People with David Darling and the New Direction Festival with Tim White. He keeps a busy concert schedule, performing regularly with regional orchestras throughout Northern California and in recital. Dan has had a private cello studio for over ten years and has been teaching in Davis for the past five.

**Beverly Wesner-Hoehn**, holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Pacific Union College, the Masters of Music degree from University of Southern California, and the Doctorate of Musical Arts, with High Distinction, from Indiana University in Bloomington, where she was later appointed Assistant Professor of Music. During her college years, Beverly studied harp at the Conservatoire Royale de la Musique in Belgium and won a Prix in Performance while on an ambassadorial scholarship from Rotary International. Dr. Bev has been featured on twelve recordings with choral and ensemble groups from around the world; she served as Administrative Director of the USA Harp Competition in Bloomington, Indiana for six years; she also served as the Treasurer of the World Harp Congress for many years and was a jury member of the prestigious International Harp Contest in Israel. Regular local concerts include the Modesto Symphony, California Music Theatre, Sacramento Choral Society and Orchestra, CSUS Orchestra and Choral groups; UC Davis/Mondavi Center and her favorite chamber group, Trio Brio (flute, viola, and harp).
